Meaningful Partnerships Overview

Partnerships are established by mutual goals and projects

- CCWA provided the in-kind established Creek Clean-Up program
- EPT supported CCWA with planning, waste disposal, and promotion
- CCWA reported tonnages, volunteer hours, and education for MS4 reporting

Partnerships grow with positive communication and commitment

- EPT promoted CCWA on their website, newsletter and social media
- CCWA approached EPT with a Riparian Buffer Planting
- EPT and CCWA partnered for a 2nd Riparian Buffer Planting

Partnerships are solidified with confidence and support

- EPT came to CCWA for storm water basin planting
- CCWA, EP and Master Gardeners planted 10,000 plugs in 6 hours

Building Partnerships

Idea

• CCWA approached EPT with idea of a **specific project** – Riparian Buffer Planting with the Chesapeake Bay Foundation 10 Million Tree Program

Focused Planning:

- Resources and Needs
- Assign roles and responsibilities
- Set realistic goals and timelines
- Method of communication
- Incorporate educational goals

Meaningful Meetings

- Review focused planning outcomes, modify plans, set new goals, roles and timelines
- Follow through with agreed upon roles and responsibilities







Growing the Meaningful Partnership

East Pennsboro Township

- Riparian Buffer GIS Map to facilitate best site of the project
- Site meeting and planting plan collaboration
- Infrastructure of a park and staff for long term maintenance
- Provided promotion and if needed EMS support
- Official MS4 reporting

CCWA

- Site meeting and planting plan collaboration
- Application to Chesapeake Bay Foundation
- Promotion, registration and organization of volunteers
- Education on planting basics and connection to the environment
- Implementation of the planting and assistance with maintenance
- Organized summary reporting to township for MS4 purposes

Strengthening Partnerships

Honest Reflection and Communication

- Trees were not planted along unconstructed swale because of miscommunication on both CCWA and EPT
- Some trees were not planted in rows easy for EPT maintenance
- Solution: After swale construction CCWA planted 30 trees to fill the gap in rows

Changing the Collaboration:

- Sewer Lines pre-marked before site meeting
- All trees marked with spray paint to avoid disc-golf recreation and planting a complete success, but be...

Flexible

- Disc golf person ripped up tubes and stakes and EPT police were called
- CCWA and EPT worked with disc golf group to relocate trees
- Disc golf group raised \$45 donation for CCWA





Environmental Education

CCWA education focus at all events:

- What is a Watershed?
- How you are a part of your watershed
- How the action is helping you locally ie drinking water, flooding
- How the action is affecting the environment including animals and plants
- Connection to the Susquehanna River, Chesapeake Bay, and oceans
- Importance of your action combating Climate Change
- What you can do after the event to help the environment

Lasting Partnerships

Storm Basin Planting

- EPT contacted CCWA to plant 10,000 plugs in bio-retention storm water basin
- CCWA led the volunteer registration and gained new contacts with EP schools
- CCWA recruited *Penn State* Master Gardeners to assist with planting plan and planting leaders. MG returning in-kind work from the EP Butterfly Garden
- EPT Maintenance staff dug 10,000 holes and prepared the site
- EPT fire company #3 provided water for the plants in a large plastic pool
- CCWA leaders bringing supplies, walkie talkies, and experience

Partnerships starting 3 years ago fostered an amazing day of 82 volunteers from toddlers to senior citizens coming together from 9 different townships/boroughs and a CCWA Member from Virginia to spend 6 hours planting native plugs to mitigate storm water pollution for the Conodoguinet Creek Watershed.





Partnership Outcomes

2017

- Creek Clean-Up 157 volunteers removed about 2.5 tons of trash from 5.5 miles
- Volunteer Value is approximately \$15,291

2018

- Creek Clean-Up 50 volunteers removed about 1.5 tons of trash from 1.9 miles
- Acri Meadow Planting -41 volunteers planted 130 trees
- Volunteer Value is approximately \$9,078

2019

- Ridley Park Planting 32 volunteers planted 112 trees
- Treemont Storm Water Planting 81 volunteers planted 10,000 plugs
- Volunteer Value is approximately \$15,312

Volunteer Value Total is almost \$40,000
People connected to their community and watershed is Priceless!
