
BFC TIMELINE



- 2014 Borough completes Strategic Plan
- Spring 2015 BFC Task Force organized
- Fall 2015 first LAB application followed by site visit and "report card"
- Fall 2017 second LAB application
- November 2017 Bronze BFC designation received 8th in PA

ENGINEERING

- Complete Streets Resolution passed
- Bike racks added or upgraded at various public facilities
- Business bike rack program now being implemented
- Initiated or supported several infrastructure improvements including:
 - Reconstruction of path connecting neighborhood to Siebert Park
 - Addition of flashing signal at major school crossing
 - Installation of mirrors in Cumberland Blvd underpass



Trail Details

The trail, shown in green, starts at Willow Park and goes north on 24th Street to Lincoln Street. It then moves along Lincoln Street to 30th Street where it turns left and heads south on 30th Street to the Flata tract it turns left on the road through the Camp Hill family vegenable gardens, silongside the recycling operation to South 24th Street. The trail then turns left and heads north on 24th Street back to Willow Park. This segment of the trail covers 2.3 milks.

Another leg of the trail, shown in yellow on the map, starts at Willow Park (24th Street and Wahrut Street) and proceeds north on 24th Street to Lincoin Street, it turns left on Lincoin Street to Willow Avenue. At Willow Avenue it turns right and heads north on Willow Avenue it turns right and heads north on Willow Avenue to the Routes 11 and 15 highway. At that point, the trail proceeds in the trunnel under the highway to Siebert Park. In Siebert Park. In Siebert Park. The trail goes along the park road past the log cabin and nakes the turn along the road. As the road goes downhild it veers to the right. This section of the trail is 1.7 miles long.

At that point it is shown on the map blue. The trail continues down the hill and ends at the Conadoguinet Creek. This section of the trail is 0.3 of a mile.

The trail shown in yellow (1,3 miles) and the trail shown in blue (0.3 of a mile) were an Eagle Scout project completed by Jim Keiser. He installed att of the mile marker signs on the yellow and blue sections of the trail.







EDUCATION

- Small local district no bussing!
- Pre-existing Safe Routes to School program
- Bike Month activities have included:
 - In-school bike safety assembly
 - Bike rodeos
 - Presence at elementary school Mayfair
 - Walk/bike to school incentive program
- Working with SD to find opportunities to place bike/ped safety into curriculum
- Looking to facilitate school-based bike club and/or mountain bike team













ENCOURAGEMENT

- Partnered with Harrisburg Bicycle Club to offer community bike rides throughout the riding season
- Bike Month activities 2016, 2017, 2018:
 - Kickoff ride with Mayor, Boro Council
 - Weekly community bike rides
 - Incentives through National Bike Challenge
 - Organized commuting opportunities
 - Gathering point for regional Ride of Silence
 - Bikes in Memorial Day parade
 - Team Camp Hill riding in Tour de Belt
- Local "Main Street" bike shop has promoted events, provided prizes for incentive programs



ENFORCEMENT

- PD has limited bike patrol
- PD participates regularly in Safe Routes to School and school safety programs
- Community survey indicated significant concerns over speed limit and stop sign observance and enforcement

EVALUATION

- BFC Committee of citizen volunteers meets regularly and has good access and relationships with Mayor, Boro Council, Boro Staff, PD, SD, etc.
- Several larger infrastructure projects are in some stage of development and BFC Committee has provided input on various aspects of bike/ped accommodation.











COMING ATTRACTIONS...

- Expansion of Harrisburg's Zagster Bike Share to include a station in Camp Hill
- Re-launch of the Goddard Trail, a 3-mile walk/bike loop around the community named for Maurice Goddard, Father of PA State Parks and a Camp Hill resident.
- Primarily at the urging of the BFC Committee, a Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan is currently being developed by a consultant to be completed in Spring of 2019.
- PennDOT and the regional MPO are conducting a safety study of a major through corridor which includes Cumberland Blvd (aka. Camp Hill Bypass) which bisects our community and significantly impacts bike/ped connectivity.
