### Research Grants due Sept. 5



The South Mountain Research Corps (SMRC) is seeking opportunities to support academic and student-focused research in environmental sciences, forestry, agriculture, cultural and historic resources, geology, geography, and land use planning.

This year the SMRC will accept applications for research projects that help address our research priorities within the range of \$1,000 to \$5,000. Previous projects have averaged around \$3,000. Priority will be given to proposals that address the research priorities, to proposals that are multidisciplinary in scope, and to proposals that help students develop the skills and expertise necessary for successful careers in land and resource management.

# Cumberland County Wants Your Feedback on Land Partnerships Plan

Cumberland County is asking for public input on the 2025 Land Partnerships Plan, a countywide strategy addressing farmland preservation, natural resource protection and parks, trails, and greenways.

The Land Partnerships Plan provides a comprehensive blueprint to help the county achieve a healthy balance between preservation and development. It outlines key natural, recreational and agricultural

assets across the county and recommends strategies to protect and enhance resources for current and future generations.

The Plan seeks to encourage action in the community and facilitate partnerships among federal, state, county, and local governments, nonprofit organizations, businesses, and landowners.

Through these partnerships, Cumberland County aims to implement the Plan's goals and actions to achieve long-term success.

Originally adopted in 2006 and updated in 2013, the latest version of the Plan was funded in part by a grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources.

Residents and stakeholders are encouraged to review the Plan <u>HERE</u> and provide written comment by Friday, Sept. 5.

# **Employment and Funding Opportunities**

### **Grants**

- <u>CAEDC Local Share Account (LSA) Grants</u>: Now accepting applications for community-focused projects like construction, planning, equipment & more. Deadline is Aug. 31.
- York County Open Space Grants: Support for land preservation & outdoor spaces. Deadline is Sept. 30.
- Adams County Parks, Recreation, and Green Space (PRGS) Grant Program: Now accepting
  applications from municipalities and eligible not-for-profits through August 29. The grant will
  provide funding for the preservation of agricultural lands, open space, park lands, historic and
  cultural resources, and the development of recreation and trail projects.
- <u>Level I Grants</u>: These grants support projects that advance WellSpan's <u>Community Health</u>
  <u>Improvement Plan</u> priorities. Projects should be new or expansions of existing programs, one-time seed, or gap funding, and have measurable impact. Level II grants are not for ongoing operational support. Awards are usually around \$5,000 to \$15,000. This grant offering will be to support

projects with a start date of January 1, 2026. You can access the Level I Application submission portal directly with this link. Applications are due by **October 31, 2025**.

- Appalachian Landscape Conservation Coordinator: The Center for Large Landscape Conservation is seeking an Appalachian Landscape Conservation Coordinator that will support collaboration across the Appalachian region to accelerate nature conservation and conservationdriven community development. The Coordinator will coordinate the network focused on the intersection of nature, climate, and the economy in the Appalachian region. The Coordinator will serve as a link and networker between the VCI Appalachian network initiatives and ensure alignment, support the sharing of resources, reduction of duplication between initiatives, and increase knowledge and capacity.
- Seasonal Land Stewardship Technician (Central PA): The Appalachian Trail Conservancy is seeking a Land Stewardship Technician that reports to the Land Stewardship Coordinator and will monitor and maintain the boundary lines of the lands conserved for the Appalachian Trail, called the A.T. corridor. This involves hiking off-trail through mountainous forests, clearing vegetation with loppers, putting up boundary signs, repainting blazes on trees, finding survey markers, and recording data. This role will work with other Land Stewardship Technicians to ensure that the Appalachian Trail is protected by a well-marked boundary line and that any violations are promptly found and resolved.
- Upper Allen Township Manager: Upper Allen Township is seeking a dynamic, people-oriented
  professional to serve as Township Manager. This strategic, engaged executive will help build and
  maintain a sustainable community where every resident can thrive. This is a high impact
